

Meet Courtney Baron UofL's New Art Library Director

COURTNEY BARON WAS PURSUING AN MA in Classics and advising undergraduate students about research in the field when she realized her real passion was helping others become confident researchers and information creators. At that moment, she decided librarianship was a better career fit for her than the more traditional academic path she had been following. Academic librarianship allowed her to stay engaged with fields of study she loved, including art, anthropology, and geographic information systems (GIS), but with a stronger focus on the dimension where she felt she had the most to offer. Courtney pivoted in a new career direction and never looked back.

Before her graduate studies, Courtney was a first-generation student in Classical Archaeology and Latin at the University of Georgia. Although she was not consciously considering a career in



librarianship at that point, she does recall that her professors made lots of assumptions about student research skills that were, in reality, not very familiar to her. Courtney credits the Classics Librarian at UGA as being one of the keys to her success as an undergrad. The experience working with this librarian, and her awareness that not all students enter college with the same educational background, have been instrumental in her teaching philosophy and professional practice ever since.

Courtney received her MLIS degree from the Valdosta State University in May 2015. Valdosta State is also in Georgia, however like most library/information science programs now, the program is delivered entirely online, which allowed her to continue living in Athens, Georgia, which she describes as "awesome." She stayed in Athens even after getting a job at Emory University's Oxford College outside Atlanta, but the intense traffic finally convinced her to move to a new location for the first time since her days as an undergrad. As Head of Library Teaching and Outreach Services at Oxford College, Courtney gained formative professional experience in information literacy, library leadership, and campus relationship building. Kitty McNeill, the Dean at Oxford College Library, was a strong advocate for professional development and promoted an organizational culture that valued reflective inquiry and collaboration. Despite the advantages of a great library and living in a highly engaged college town, Courtney missed the excitement and cultural opportunities of a larger place.

Our position as Director of the Bridwell Art Library came along at just the right time for Courtney. She was ready for a job with more responsibility and room for creativity, and the city of Louisville was very appealing to her. As you speak with Courtney about her decision to move away from Georgia for the first time, you begin to understand just how important research is to her and how she integrates it into all aspects of her life. She already had a good impression of the area based on two local writers. Ann Bogel is the mastermind behind Modern Mrs. Darcy, a blog about reading that "explores the intersection of the timeless and the timely." She was also very familiar with the work of Maria Accardi, Coordinator of Instruction and Reference at Indiana University – Southeast, who is a thought leader in the areas of "library instruction theory and practice, feminist pedagogy and other forms of critical pedagogy." She also knew the traffic was nothing like Atlanta's.

Courtney moved here with her boyfriend Andy who is from Denver, Colorado. Now that she has settled in here, Courtney's initial impressions about the vibrant cultural life and the charms of Louisville have been confirmed. She truly loves the walkability and character of the different neighborhoods, and in her current neighborhood

between the Highlands and NuLu, she can walk to just about anything she needs to do except for coming to work. In their spare time, Courtney and Andy are currently exploring other neighborhoods to prepare for moving from their apartment to a house.

Sweet end to 7-year effort

If you've been reading *The Owl* during the past seven years, you've probably encountered an article or an update about the *Louisville Leader* transcription project. Preparations for this initiative began in fall 2012, and involved Carrie Daniels, Randy Kuehn, Terri Holtze, and me, along with Public History graduate student Meredith Maple-Gitter. Along with the public launch of 900 extant issues of the historic African American newspaper in Digital Collections in February 2013, we publicized a plea to the community to help make the articles searchable by transcribing them using an Omeka Scripto interface. We then periodically re-publicized that request internally and externally, because it turns out 900



newspapers have around 50,000 articles of unique content requiring transcription!

I am delighted to report that, thanks to an intensive internal effort in 2019 involving Archives and Special Collections (ASC) employees and student workers, along with other dedicated volunteers, we have completed the transcription project, permitting the Office of Libraries Technology to retire the aged Omeka server, which outlived its life expectancy by several years while contributing to the extension of the *Leader*'s legacy by many more.



ASC celebrated the milestone with seven special guests the descendants of I. Willis Cole, the Leader's founder and publisher - and a very special cake featuring a Leader page, which of course had to be cut around the articles, as has been required by our article transcription workflow. Archivist Tom Owen, who helped microfilm the Leader in 1977, thus preserving it and enabling its scanning 35 years later, made remarks, as did Cole's grandchildren Aaron Cole and (in absentia) Nora Cole, read by her niece, Angela.
